CANINE RECRUITMENT

BUILDING THE PARTNERSHIPS THAT SAVE LIVES

One of SDF's dearly held principles is recruiting canine search candidates for our program from among the homeless dogs in our nation's shelters, saving their lives and training them to someday save others. Finding high-drive dogs that possess all the characteristics of a successful search dog can be challenging, which is why collaboration with shelters and rescue organizations is vital.

From raising awareness to behavior assessment to performance evaluations, our Recruitment Team engages with shelters across the country to build and nurture meaningful relationships that may someday save lives. And because SDF has been around for decades, many of our partnerships have too.

First introduced to SDF in 2005, Homeward Bound Golden Retriever Rescue and Sanctuary is one of our longest partnerships. Run solely by volunteers, Homeward Bound rescues Golden Retrievers and Golden mixes and finds them loving homes through a comprehensive adoption program. Like SDF, they offer a lifetime commitment to dogs who enter their program, so if they're not adopted, they always have a home at the sanctuary. Homeward Bound also realizes that some dogs require a more dynamic environment than a typical pet home can provide. Happily, SDF has been able to help some of those dogs find their perfect place.

Baxter was found wandering the streets of Northern California by Homeward Bound's own founders, Mike and Jody Jones. He displayed extraordinary drive and strength—exactly the kind of dog we look for in a search candidate. Baxter joined our program, graduated from search dog training, and enjoyed a long career with Gary Durian of the Los Angeles County Fire Department, deploying multiple times to various local and national disasters, including Hurricanes Gustav and Ike. In 2010, the pair responded to the 7.0 magnitude earthquake in Haiti, combing the wreckage for 16 days and assisting other SDF teams to bring 12 people to safety. The duo deployed again to a tsunami in Japan before Baxter's retirement in 2011.

Gizmo is another Homeward Bound alum whose friendly personality won over staff, but his toy drive was the real standout. Gizmo's enthusiasm and natural talent earned him a place in our program, where he is currently in the senior class of search dog candidates.

Search dog training requires mastery of many skills, and often, canine candidates aren't comfortable performing them all, even if they have the aptitude to do so. For dogs who ultimately decide that urban search and rescue isn't for them, we look closely at their preferences to see if they would shine in a different job or be happiest in a pet home. Homeward Bound alum Asher is one of our recruits who decided against a career in search and is

currently looking for a family willing to help him thrive. You can read his bio and see photos of Asher and other dogs looking for a home on our website.

These are just a few of the countless dogs who have found purpose and a brighter future through collaboration between SDF and shelters like Homeward Bound. By working together to help high-drive homeless dogs achieve their potential, these partnerships safeguard not only the dogs' lives but also the lives of people in the communities where they serve.

CAREER CHANGE

FORMER SEARCH CANDIDATES TURN THEIR NOSES TO CONSERVATION

Every year, SDF explores new detection careers for canine recruits who do not find their perfect fit in disaster search, including the growing field of conservation detection. As the range of conservation disciplines increases, so do opportunities for high-drive dogs to thrive while helping people and the environment. Thanks to partnerships with organizations that specialize in conservation detection, our former search candidates have found rewarding careers in the great outdoors, using their incredible noses on countless projects to improve efficiency, boost accuracy, or perform tasks that humans can't.

Moomba - Mussel Dogs

This was the case for Moomba, who we recruited from Klamath Animal Shelter in Oregon after staff noted her toy drive. Ultimately, Moomba didn't like walking on rubble, so our team secured her a trial with Mussel Dogs, an organization providing canine detection of invasive quagga and zebra mussels in California waterways.

Native to Eastern Europe, quagga and zebra mussels hitch rides on watercraft and, with no natural predators, quickly establish colonies with catastrophic effects. Their swift proliferation can clog intake structures like water treatment facilities and power plants and destroy ecosystems by filtering plankton out of the water, robbing native mussels and fish of their food source. The threat these mussels pose is so grave that not even one must be allowed into pristine bodies of water, and that's where Moomba and Mussel Dogs come in.

By sniffing along the bottom of a boat, a detection dog's keen nose can determine if quagga or zebra mussels are present and prevent possible infestation. More impressively, these dogs can even detect *veligers*, the microscopic larvae of zebra mussels, so that invasion by the pesky mollusks can be averted as early as possible.

Aladar - Conservation Canines

Another of our candidates, Aladar, was seized from his owners by Salt Lake County Animal Services after warnings for mistreatment went unheeded.

Aladar's love of playing ball got him into SDF's search program; his dislike of some aspects of disaster zones made him eligible for a career change. He was adopted by Conservation Canines, part of the Center for Conservation Biology at the University of Washington, and immediately began training to detect carnivore scat for a wolf migration project in the Cascade Mountains.

Because dogs can learn practically any scent, the projects they can assist with are endless, and lucky pups like Aladar remain engaged with their jobs by learning to identify new odors in novel environments. Aladar's most recent assignment is learning to detect illegal timber in vacuumed air samples from shipping containers, which will help port authorities screen cargo for environmental contraband with less impact on operations.

Mamba - k9InSCENTive

Former stray Maggie entered search training with a serious ball obsession and great potential as a search dog—until her medical screening revealed the development of mild hip dysplasia. High-energy Maggie still craved a job, so she went for a trial with k9InSCENTive, LLC, to test her skills in a lower-impact environmental detection career. She excelled at the work and was added to the k9InSCENTive team owned by Lauralea Oliver, who renamed her Mamba.

Mamba and her canine coworkers assist their handlers with data collection for environmental impact studies at wind farms. Formerly done by people alone, a human data collector would walk sections of the wind farm in a grid pattern, looking for the remains of birds and bats killed by turbines. This was a slow process since wind farms can be thousands of acres in size. Accuracy was also an issue as identification was done visually, and animal remains were only sometimes intact.

Putting dogs on the job dramatically improved efficiency and precision. Lauralea, a veteran of these studies, says that detection rates increased substantially with dogs in this role.

Dogs are so much better at this than humans that the Department of Fish and Wildlife, the U.S. Forest Service, and others have started making it a requirement that detection dogs assist in their studies, Lauralea shared.

Faster and more accurate data collection has made it easier to devise mitigation strategies that protect vulnerable animals. "[Wind farm operators] can make efforts to minimize impact based on migration patterns, season, and temperature," Lauralea says, for example, temporarily shutting down turbines in a flight path of migrating birds until they are safely through.

Whether sniffing out invasive species, preventing the transport of contraband, or saving avian lives, our career change dogs are using their unique talents to positively impact our world. Just as importantly, from their perspective, they are having the time of their lives doing a job they love. As the field of conservation detection evolves, we can't wait to help even more high-drive dogs step into new and exciting opportunities that benefit us all.

DEPLOYMENT SPOTLIGHT

TWO SDF-TRAINED TEAMS DEPLOY TO BUILDING EXPLOSION IN TIIUANA, MEXICO

On October 20, 2023, SDF-trained search teams Luis Garcia & Montecito and Fidel Gomez & Gemma of Baja California Task Force 3 responded to a building explosion in the Las Cumbres neighborhood of Tijuana, Mexico. The explosion, caused by a possible gas leak, occurred around 6:35 a.m., destroying a house in Privada Sierra Vizcaino and leaving the inhabitants trapped under rubble, according to authorities.

Rafeal Carillo Venegas, Director of the Tijuana Fire Department, confirmed that two victims died in the explosion. In addition to the destroyed house, the blast also caused damage to nearby properties, collapsing the fence at one home and breaking the windows of another. Search Team Luis Garcia & Montecito cleared the immediate area to ensure no survivors were trapped in the debris.

As we send our heartfelt condolences to those affected by this tragedy, we are grateful for our search teams' swift and efficient actions and their commitment to supporting their community in times of crisis.

CANINE TEAMS JOIN SEARCH FOR HIKERS AMID TOUGH CONDITIONS IN CATSKILL MOUNTAINS

On August 18, 2023, SDF-trained canine search teams Brian Girard & Keila and Brook Rowley & Echo of New York Task Force 2 responded to a report of two hikers lost in the Catskill Mountains.

The two missing men, ages 18 and 20, were among a group of 16 hikers and four counselors from a camp in South Fallsburg, NY. The lost hikers, who both have autism, were separated from their group on Thursday afternoon, prompting an extensive search through mountainous terrain. The canine search teams joined dozens of state police, park rangers, volunteers, and members of the Orthodox Jewish community in the search for the missing men in less-than-ideal weather conditions.

Retired handler Greg Gould, who was supervising the canine search, reported it had rained hard the day before, and they began their search at around 10 p.m. on Thursday. Slippery, wet ground and dense fog made

the search conditions challenging and forced them to keep the search dogs on leashes at times for safety.

The canine portion of the search was called off at 5:30 a.m. because of an incoming thunderstorm, but the missing men were subsequently spotted by other search personnel and brought to safety, suffering only minor injuries.

Greg Gould shared, "The two canines and the handlers and spotters worked a very difficult search last night. It was extremely foggy, and the terrain was extremely difficult and slippery. They performed well above what was asked of them and conditions were anything but normal."

New York Task Force 2 remains one of our roster's busiest groups. This is the eleventh deployment for Brook Rowley & Echo since 2019, including seven missing person searches, one collapsed structure, and three hurricanes. Brian Girard & Keila have deployed 21 times since 2017, including thirteen missing persons, three structure collapses, one flood, and four hurricanes.

We are incredibly proud of these teams for their history of service and their consistent readiness to assist communities in need.
